COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Study of "coming of age" literature in two or more countries, not including the United States

GENERAL COURSE OBJECTIVES:

1. Recognize the elements of a global society, particularly commonalities and differences in the coming of age process across cultures.
2. Recognize cultural elements of societies other than Western Europe or North America.
3. Identify common themes and issues of adolescence.
4. Be able to work in a class group and within groups toward the sharing of ideas and diverse perceptions.
5. Compare and evaluate works of literature from different countries, using literary elements and definitions of literature.
6. Use research to expand knowledge of the context of literature.

7. Identify, read, and evaluate a coming of age novel or autobiography.
8. Share that evaluation.
